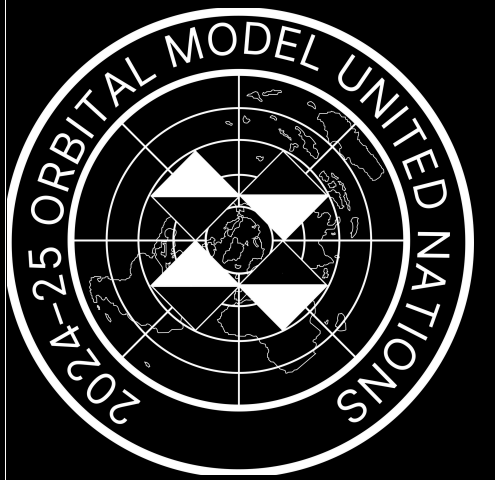


CLOSING CEREMONY

EXPERIENCES OF THE BRITISH AMBASSADOR

The British Ambassador's experiences working in different countries, including Finland, Bosnia, Slovenia, and the UK, have shown her that each nation's unique history and democratic development shape its perspectives. This has reinforced the importance of listening without immediate judgment to truly understand different viewpoints in diplomacy.

The British Ambassador thinks the most rewarding part of being an ambassador is engaging with the next generation of diplomats and leaders, which is truly inspiring. The most challenging part is adapting to a new country and learning to live in a different environment and navigating the transition while understanding what you miss from home. The British Ambassador thinks the most pressing global issue young leaders should focus on is climate change, as highlighted by our Secretary General in the closing ceremony speech. The climate emergency requires everyone's attention because it won't change on its own. Climate change often drives wars by causing resource shortages and conflicts, and unlike other challenges, we cannot turn back the clock on it. That is why it must be a key focus for all of us moving forward.

The British Ambassador shared one thing people might not know about working with a guide dog and told us that their fundamental training is simply to walk in a straight line until they encounter an obstacle, a road crossing, or steps. They don't instinctively know routes to specific places. The handler must guide them and build familiarity with routes over time. Another unique aspect is that as an
